

Student Right-to-Know Fall 2013 Graduation Rate Survey GRS1 2014 Report

The Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990, as amended by the Higher Educational Technical Assistance Amendments of 1991, require that all institutions participating in Title IV student financial assistance programs disclose the graduation rate for the most recent cohort of full time, first time in college students who have graduated within 150% of the normal time frame for their degree (6 years).

Once a student is in the cohort, they remain in the cohort, even if they switch to part-time or drop out. However, adjustments can be made to the initial cohort for exclusions, which include the death of a student, permanent disability, military deployment, or an official church mission.

Graduation and Completion Rates Four Year Institutes

One of the measures of excellence in teaching and learning is the rate at which students complete their programs of study and/or transfer to four-year universities. Students enrolled at Daytona State College met the following criteria for this report:

- Indicated they were seeking a degree or certificate
- Enrolled in college for the first time in the Summer/Fall
- Enrolled for at least twelve semester hours

Florida Four Year Colleges do not have a first time full time bachelor seeking cohort. The Florida College System is a 2 + 2 System. Four – Year Institutional Report of Fall 2006-07.

In the fall of 2007, 1,351 students enrolled at Daytona State College with the following status as of Summer/Fall 2013:

- 37.1% - have completed their degree within 150% of normal time of which 6.6% completed the program in less than two years
- 7.2% - have transferred without a degree to another public community college or university in Florida
- 2.8% - were student exclusions. Exclusions include deceased students, permanently disabled students, students which left school to serve in military or students on an official church mission.
